Both teams received a lot of praise and team one went through to the regional final - the first time we've got through to that round in this competition! Imogen was awarded 'Best Questioner' in the regional final; the judges said she was 'outstanding', that they were 'spellbound' by Denny's speech and that Nasif's chairing style was 'warm, confident and engaging'.
