

Speech Day


At the beginning of term, pupils, parents and staff gathered at the Sage in Gateshead for the Senior Schools' annual Speech Day.

This year, we were lucky enough to be joined by Professor Russell Cowburn as guest speaker.

As a former pupil of Dame Allan's, it was a delight to welcome him back, and there was much amusement when he revealed a school photo of himself and his sister - known to us as Mrs Fletcher, Head of Modern Foreign Languages!

Now a Fellow of the Royal Society and Director of Research at the Cavendish Laboratory at the University of Cambridge, Professor Cowburn presented his speech in the style of a TED talk, 'What will science look like in the 2020s?'

Attendees were also treated to an excerpt from the Lower School Musical, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat, as well as an impassioned speech from pupils about their work with local charity Eating Stones, and music and dance performances by some of our talented students.

Cross-Country

Our junior teams are doing particularly well at the moment with the junior girls (Years 8 and 9) winning the Tyne and Wear team competition and the junior boys (Years 7 and 8) winning the Northumberland round of the ESAA Cross-Country Cup.

Water-skiing

In August, Year II Anna competed at this year's British Waterski and Wakeboard Annual Cutting Edge Boat competition as part of the Northern Team. This is the national grassroots competition for young skiers aged 16 years and under.

Anna competed in four of the disciplines - Kneeboard, Wakeboard, Slalom and Trick Ski - winning the girls' slalom, her favourite discipline where the skier runs a set course of six buoys on a single ski. The speed of the boat increases on each run making the course progressively harder to complete.

CCF RM competition

At the beginning of October, nine of our CCF cadets took part in the Sir Steuart Pringle Trophy at Lympstone, Devon. Held at the Commando Training Centre, this nationwide Cadet Competition saw our students compete in activities such as stalking, first aid (triage, trauma care and reporting) and map reading.

This was only the second time the cadets have taken part in this competition and they were up against really strong RM CCF schools such as Harrow, Rugby, Charterhouse, and Winchester College. Whilst the cadets didn't leave the event with a trophy, they took second place in stalking which was assessed by a Royal Marine sniper and overall finished just one point behind Rugby School. We hope they are as proud of their performance as we are; they showed determination and resilience in every task.

Top marks!

Students and staff at Dame Allan's Schools in Newcastle are celebrating another excellent batch of GCSE and A Level examination results.

At A Level, seventeen students achieved all A*/A grades.

Cameron Lackey did particularly well obtaining three A*s in biology, chemistry and mathematics, which will see him studying medicine at Downing College Cambridge in September.

At GCSE, 21 students achieved all 7-9 grades.

Two of those high achievers are twins Emily and Libby Doughty, both of whom received a set of straight 7-9 grades.

Emily and Libby are both members of the North Tyneside Youth Council and heavily involved in the debate and public speaking events at Dame Allan's. This passion for politics will continue for Emily when she returns to the Sixth Form to study politics

and government, English literature and history. Libby will join her sister in English literature classes, but is keen to pursue a career in medicine and so will study biology and chemistry as her other A Level choices.

Dr Hind, Principal at Dame Allan's Schools said: "We are delighted to be celebrating the success of our students again this year. The ethos of Dame Allan's Schools is to educate the whole child and support our students in being the very best they can be. We are delighted when these efforts bring students their best possible results."




The Wild West End

The Schools have been taking part in a nature project run by the local partnership group, Greening Wingrove. The 'Wild West End Project' is a two year project to see whether there are hedgehogs, swifts, house martins and bats living in the Wingrove and Arthur's Hill area. All of these creatures are classified as 'at risk' as the numbers of them are declining in Britain. The aim is to understand where they nest, where they eat and where they sleep in the winter (hedgehogs and bats) so improvements can be made, if necessary, to ensure the West End is a better place for them.

Surveys have been run at both the Junior School and Senior Schools sites. This involved placing some food in a 'hedgehog tunnel' and recording the footprints of the animals who walk through it. Students diligently checked the tunnel every day for a week, replenishing food and recording results. We're pleased to say... both sites have hedgehog presence!

Safeguarding at Dame Allan's

There is plenty of evidence to link children's use of social media and their mental health and wellbeing. Parents and carers should be aware of the social pressures that children commonly experience on a number of different platforms. The National Online Safety group are producing a series of guides to these pressures. The first is based on the simple 'like'. Please have a look at this and discuss it with your child. On this topic we are receiving worrying information about pupils' use of TikTok. When a child (13+ with parental permission) signs up for TikTok, their account is public by default, meaning anyone can see their videos, send direct messages, and use location information.

Parents should make sure to turn on all privacy settings for accounts their children are using, so only people you and they know can interact with videos or message on the app. That means either opting for a private account or changing the settings for comments, duets, reactions, and messages to "Friends" instead of "Everyone". You can also turn those features off completely. It is advised that the site is used with parental supervision.

In relation to Chromebook use, we remind parents of our stated policy that every pupil is ultimately responsible for everything that happens on their device. They can be quickly locked and unlocked if a pupil needs to leave them momentarily. Pleading that someone else misused them will not be deemed an acceptable excuse.
